**Direction: history** 

A devised theatre performance whose documentary material mines the news for headlines that

shocked the nation, as well as stories that slipped by unremarked.

"Family tragedy: man 91 and wife 80 found dead with gunshot wounds to the head in their Athens

seaside flat, shot with an old pistol from the 1940s." Along with inconsequential but amusing

events recorded by inhabitants of the blogosphere, this headline from last December about the

double suicide of an elderly couple who "didn't want to be a burden to their children" becomes the

lived material of a production whose mosaic-like depiction of Greece is made out of news stories

great and small. Grotesque scandals, crimes explicable and inexplicable, brave deeds, incredible

adventures, meaningless achievements and bizarre tricks of fate can all find themselves in the

limelight when they grab the attention of the journalists who record our daily lives. Reflecting the

contemporary trend for theatre-documentaries, the company dipped into the fertile waters of the

Greek printed and electronic press and netted major and minor stories published over the last sixty

or so years. The documentary style filters the production's aesthetic, but the tales of everyday folk

remain centre-stage, and laughter is intertwined with tears. Combining the funny and the

frightening, the trivial and the important, the comic and the tragic, Direction: history's three

director-performers present us with their own potted history of recent decades.

Panagiota Konstantinakou is a graduate of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (Theatre Department), and has a post-graduate diploma in Theatre Research from Glasgow University. She has contributed as a dramatist to over 15 productions, most recently *Baby octopuses and other stories*.
